Refinery operable capacity utilization for the 4 weeks ending March 30, 2001, was slightly above last year's rate. This week's operable capacity utilization rate was 89.1 percent. The 4 week average for motor gasoline production was slightly below last year's level, while distillate fuel oil production was 6 percent above.

Crude oil stocks were 1.7 MMB higher than last week's level. Motor gasoline stocks were 3.3 MMB lower than last week's level. The current 193.0 MMB includes reformulated gasoline stocks of 35.9 MMB, but excludes oxygenate stocks of MTBE and fuel ethanol. At the end of February, they were about 8.0 MMB and 2.5 MMB, respectively. Distillate stocks were 3.9 MMB lower than last week's level. They are 7.4 MMB higher than last year's level, but dipped below the average range.

Net imports of crude oil and petroleum products during the 4 weeks ending March 30, 2001 were 13 percent higher than the levels for the same period last year.

Over the past four weeks, motor gasoline product supplied was 3 percent above last year's level, while distillate fuel oil product supplied was 12 percent above.

The average world crude oil price on March 30, 2001 was \$23.07 per barrel, up \$0.28 from the previous week but \$1.71 less than last year. WTI was \$26.37 per barrel on March 30, 2001, down \$0.94 from the previous week and \$0.49 less than last year. The spot price for conventional gasoline in the New York Harbor was 80.03 cents per gallon, down 2.87 cents from the previous week and 1.60 cents less than a year ago. The spot price for diesel fuel in the New York Harbor on March 30, 2001 was 75.85 cents per gallon, down 3.72 cents from the previous week and 2.03 cents lower than last year.

The national average retail regular gasoline price was 144.2 cents per gallon on April 2, 2001, up 3.8 cents from last week but 6.10 cents lower than a year ago. The national average retail diesel fuel price increased after eight consecutive weeks of decline to 139.1 cents per gallon on April 2, 2001, rising 1.2 cents from last week but 5.1 cents less than last year.

Data for the week ending March 30 reflects benchmarking to the January *Petroleum Supply Monthly* values.
